

HOME LANGUAGE PARENT INFORMATION

A home language is a language learned in childhood in the home environment. It is also referred to as mother tongue, first language, community language or native language.

You are your child's first teacher.

When you speak the language which comes most naturally to you, your child develops a strong foundation of language skills that can then extend into English.



Don't be afraid to share your home language with your child.

Learning more than one language does not usually affect your child's speech development. Rather, it strengthens their concentration, understanding of language, creativity and empathy.

Language is a bridge to culture.

Sharing your home language with your child gives them a strong sense of identity, the ability to relate more easily to relatives and community members of their culture, and boosts their confidence and self-esteem.



We know that the ages of 0-5 are a critical period for language acquisition.

For young children with constant exposure to more than one language, bilingualism can come as naturally as learning to crawl or walk. Multicultural parenting may not always be easy, but it delivers many benefits for your child and your family.

- The State Library of Victoria hosts a large collection of children's picture books in many different community languages in their Children's Quarter. Though these books cannot be borrowed, a visit to the State Library to browse and share these books with your child could be a special day out.
